





On April 13th eighteen FVCC members braved a wet Spring Day to attend a Wine Tasting Tour to Fallbrook 33 N Winery. Jim Binford led several cars on a windy backroad tour to the winery, including Bill and Robin Kemper, Phil Pizzuto and Ernie & Kelly Christie driving their vintage cars. The tour included driving backroads west of Fallbrook and then central Fallbrook to the Winery. The tour initially went past the Winery entrance road to include a scenic valley road east of the winery and then back to the winery.

Once at the winery, attendees checked in with Jim and Debbie Meadows to receive their ticket to sample six wines and a chance at a raffle for a free bottle of wine. Since the weather did not cooperate, we sat in the cave portion of the winery which turned out to be great accommodations to keep dry. We sat inside the room that once was the Champagne cellar complete with a table top that was once the door to the cellar. Everyone enjoyed the wine and the delicious appetizers that Myrna presented to the group.

During the wine tasting we were entertained by Evan Parker (Fallbrook 33 N head winemaker) who also dabbles as an interior painter for the winery (see picture). Evan provided us insight on winemaking, Fallbrook soil for growing grapes and the winemaking business (if you have a spare \$2.5 Million dollars you might start your own winery in Fallbrook -LOL).

All in all, a good time was had by all, especially Steve Shapiro who won the raffle for a 2019 Winemakers Vineyard Collection #12 Cabernet Sauvignon bottle of wine. (Steve, do you still have it?) If you haven't been to Fallbrook 33 N Winery, stop by and sample some of their great tasting

My 75th birthday was an MG landmark for me. Let me tell you the 'Tale Of Two TDs'.

In 1963 I was a sophomore in college in need of a car. The only car I could afford was a 1953 MG TD. At that time, it was just an old car. Not quite a collector's item yet. I learned a lot about keeping an older car running, but really enjoyed every minute of it. In 1966, just in time for graduation, I got a letter from Uncle Sam that started out with

the salutation "Greetings"....my draft notice. I reluctantly had to sell my TD and report for my physical. Throughout the years, whenever I saw an MG TD I would always go look at it and recount to Peggy how much I regretted having to part with mine.


Fast forward to 2019....January 1st, my 75th birthday. My wife Peggy surprised me with a gathering of family from all across the country to help me celebrate. The big surprise was when we all got in our cars to go to lunch Peggy told me to turn into the local Oceanside airport. There, on the runway, was an unbelievable sight...a bright red bi-plane. Peggy knew I had always wanted to get a ride in one, and there sat my birthday ride. It was sheer joy, flying out over the coast and down to La Jolla and back.

When we returned to the landing strip and I deplaned, I noticed an autumn red TD parked at the far end of the

parking lot. I immediately went into a double time trot to take a look at it. There was a For Sale sign on the wind-

I was in a state of total shock...first a thrilling hour in the air in a bi plane and now this. Peggy and I climbed into the TD and headed for home...we made it almost three miles when the transmission locked up and was frozen in third gear....AAA to the rescue and the 'new' TD was towed to my garage to await finding someone to work on it. After a few phone calls to local MG car club members, I got a referral to Mel's Repair shop and there sat my 75th birthday present waiting for parts. Thanks to Moss Motors and a few local MG car club members the transmission was repaired, a complete brake rebuild was done and I was on the road.

I was curious about how this car became my 75th birth-day gift...after some gentle coaxing, the saga of the second TD unfolded. My wife and oldest son Kevin had conspired to find one for me. They found one in the Seattle WA area at a dealership. Peggy purchased it in late summer after having my youngest son Matt, who lives in the Seattle area, check it out. It sat in storage until the last week in December, when the dealer was to truck it down to Fallbrook where we live and where my wife had made arrangements with a neighbor to have it hidden in his barn until the surprise delivery on January 1. Everything went awry when the dealer called my wife and told her his delivery truck had broken down and he could not deliver the car.

Enter my son Matt to the rescue. He rented a small truck, removed the front and rear bumpers, cut two inches off the tailpipe, loaded the TD and drove it to California for the surprise. He then took it from its hiding place in the neighbor's barn and drove it to the Oceanside airport while I was airborne.

A bit of History:

THE FORGOTTEN STORY OF PREWAR BRITISH CARS THAT WERE ACTUALLY BUILT IN AMERICA

Since British cars are the Special Feature of our big car show in May, it seems appropriate to explore some of the forgotten history of British cars in America. Most people today know that many brands of foreign cars are currently being assembled in America, such as: BMW, Honda, Hyundai, Kia, Mazda, Mercedes-Benz, Nissan, Subaru, Toyota, Volkswagen, and Volvo. But foreign cars being assembled in America is nothing new, before World War 2 there were two British marques that were made here in America: Rolls-Royce and Austin.

These two companies and their cars could not be more different. The Rolls-Royce Ghost "Silver Ghost" and the Austin Seven occupied the highest and lowest segments of the British marketplace. Rolls-Royce automobiles were owned by the Royal Family and the ultra-wealthy, whereas the Austin Seven was a small economy car for the working-class person. Regardless of their relative status, in both cases it was believed that the American market was sufficiently lucrative to justify the expense of investing in an American production facility.

The Springfield Rolls-Royce (1919-1926)



In 1921, Rolls-Royce of America opened a factory in Springfield, Massachusetts to produce an American version of the Rolls-Royce Silver Ghost. In those days most of the world's luxury automobile companies produced a running car, but without a body. The buyer was expected to selecte an outside coachbuilder to build a custom or semi-custom body for the car. The same was true with the cars from Rolls-Royce of America, which were often bodied by such respected American coachbuilders as Brewster, Willoughby, Merrimac and Hollbrook.

The Springfield-built Rolls-Royce cars also used some American components, such as an American Bosch charging system and American wheels/tires. And many of the Springfield Rolls-Royce cars were built with left-hand drive for the American roads. As Rolls-Royce in England updated the model, the American car was similarly updated. When the New Phantom model replaced the Silver Ghost in England, the same happened to the American built cars.

In total, the Springfield factory produced 1,703 Rolls-Royce Ghosts and 1,241 of the Phantoms by the time the factory closed in 1931. Today the Springfield Rolls-Royce cars are among the most beautiful, sporting and valuable of all prewar Rolls-Royce cars. Since British cars are the Special Feature, perhaps a Springfield Rolls-Royce will attend our show in May.



American Austin Car Company (1929-35)

The Austin Motor Company of England (1905-1952) introduced the original Austin Seven in 1923. It was a tiny economy car. Think of it as a 2/3rds scale version of a Ford Model T. The British Austin Seven was inexpensive, thrifty and reliable. It had a little 747 cc, in-line 4 cylinder motor and a 3-speed transmission, but it would seat two adults in the front and two small children or bags in the rear. The Austin Seven was considered a step-up from a motorcycle with a sidecar, for the British working class man with a family. It proved to be very popular at home and abroad. American Austin Car Company (1929-35)



The American Austin Car Company was founded in February 23, 1929. The new company purchased a building in Butler, Pennsylvania to produce a licensed version of the Austin Seven for America. Automobile production began in



1930, just a few months after the Wall Street Crash. Unfortunately the demand for all new cars quickly evaporated and many well-established American car companies slipped into bankruptcy and disappeared.

One might think that a small economy car would sell well during the Great Depression, but the reality of economy-of-scale resulted in the Austin being priced only a few dollars less than the mass-produced Ford Model A--which offered much more car for the money! By 1934, about 20,000 American Austin cars had been built, but the company was insolvent.

In bankruptcy court the company assets were sold and

reorganized as the American Bantam Car Company (1935-1956) to build an updated Austin Seven known as the Bantam. About 6,000 Bantam cars were sold by the time production ended in 1941.

During production and afterwards, because of their diminutive size, the American Austin and the Bantam were the source of many jokes in newspaper cartoons and Hollywood movies. Sadly, except for a few ardent fans, these little American-built automobiles were largely forgotten by the 1950s.



Important Postscript

Rolls-Royce, as everyone knows, has survived to the present. It is currently a subsidiary of the BMW Car Company. In 2005 annual sales were a mere 796, but by 2022 sales were up to a marque record of 6,021. In case you are interested, new Rolls-Royce motorcars cost over \$300,000.

American Austin and the Jeep Story: American Austin was reorganized into the American Bantam Car Company in 1935. In 1940, American Bantam designed and built the very first Jeep (as it was later known) for the U.S. Government. American Bantam was given the first contract to build a limited series of experimental Jeeps for testing, but Bantam was too small to produce the numbers anticipated for the war, so the plans were handed over to Willys-Overland and Ford for war production. Bantam was awarded a contract to produce light trailers for the new Jeep.

Austin Seven (1923-1939): The British small car was updated over the years and ultimately sold 290,000 cars in England by the time war ended production 1939. Besides being produced under license in America, the Austin Seven was offered as the first BMW car in Germany, known as the BMW Dixi. In France it was sold as the Rosengarts. In Japan, an unlicensed version was the first Datsun/Nissan. Today's Jaguar cars can trace their history to the Swallow Sidecar Company, later known as "S.S.", which started working on cars by building custom bodies for the Austin Seven.

After the war, some used Austin Sevens were made into racing "specials". In 1948, Colin Chapman, built the first Lotus sports car, the Mark 1, which was based on a used Austin Seven. The first race car built by New Zealander, Bruce McLaren was based on the Seven.

In 1999, automobile historians around the world were asked to rate the most important cars built during the 20th Century, the Ford Model T came in 1st and the Austin Seven was voted the 2nd Most Important Car of the Century. An impressive history for a little economy car!
