Another Piece of Fallbrook Car History



I was working out of town and was surfing eBay one evening in my hotel room (never a good idea). I found the Buick and it was in Fallbrook! It had been totaled due to an accident. I believe it was driven off the road into a creek bed. The ad mentioned that it had frame and engine damage. It didn't look all that bad to me so I put in a low bid. I'm back in town the next week and get a notification that I had won!

I made arrangements to pay and pick the car up. When I arrived, I was greeted by the owner, a woman named Lynn Burch. For those of you who don't know, Lynn was a long

time Fallbrook Vintage Car Club member. The car was her pride and joy and she called it **Big Red**. She typically drove

Miss Fallbrook in the Christmas parade and even had a portrait of herself in the car hanging in her home.

The car had been featured on a few of the car show posters. It came with the posters, manuals, and even some 8-track tapes.

Lynn invited me to a FVCC meeting and Robin and I soon became members.

So then it was time to load up the car. It was damaged on the one side fender, door, hood, and grill. The door wouldn't open. Frame damage? As I started to drive it on the trailer, there was an extremely loud clanging coming from engine. I shut it off as soon as possible. Engine damage? What have I gotten myself into now?



I contemplated leaving the Buick on trailer and taking it out to the Pomona Swap meet to try and recover my money, but I decided to have a better look first. I found that the shield on the torque converter had been damaged (most likely from the trip into the creek bed). I removed the shield and the mighty 455 purred like it was 1972 and gas was 36 cents a gallon, no engine damage. Then I removed the damaged fender and door could be opened, no frame damage.



AUTOMOBILE INSPIRATION: THE RED CAR (1954)

Obviously, many things influence one's interest in owning a particular vintage car: family, friends, and even that "cool guy" from high school! Plus there are certain movies, TV shows, songs and books that can inspire a person to own a particular car. Perhaps one book, *The Red Car* by Don Stanford (1954) is the most influential car book of all time.

In the summer of 1952, published author Don Stanford was in need of some cash and asked his agent to find him a book writing job. His agent said that a publisher was looking for someone to write a young-adult book for boys. After the great success of *The Black Stallion* (1941) for girls, the publisher was looking for something new for boys.

Don Stanford was a MG TC owner and occasional racer. The publisher thought that a book about a boy and his first car might prove popular with some boys. Stanford was not interested in writing a "children's book", but after discussing the deal with the

publisher, he learned that they were looking for a book that "didn't talk down" to the boys. The idea was to challenge the young reader with detailed technical information, complex characters, and an inspirational story. Don Stanford was intrigued and accepted the assignment. He spent the summer of 1954 writing the book.

The result was an engaging story about a 16 year old boy who lived on a farm in a small town in the Colorado Rocky Mountains and the red car that profoundly changed his life.

As the story goes... One day in late May a smashed-up red sports car arrives in the small town gas station/garage. Several of the local boys stop by for a quick look. Much to their surprise, the car is a MG TC, the first that any of them had ever seen. Our young hero, Hap Adams, falls completely in love with the beautiful red car. The garage owner, Frenchy, a mysterious foreigner with a suspected car racing background, tells Hap that the car might be available at a very reasonable price because of the accident damage. Hap quickly vows to own that car, regardless of what it takes or what anyone thinks about it.

In addition to his summer chores on the family farm, Hap gets two jobs to raise the money to buy and repair the red MG TC. One of his jobs is at Frenchy's gas station. With his help, Hap is able to rebuild the TC by the end of summer. Frenchy is a demanding but fair boss and an inspirational sports car mentor. Frenchy also teaches Hap how to drive his small and underpowered MG fast through sharp turns. Meanwhile, Arthur Wister, the rich "outsider" new to town, who is also a sports car owner, floats the idea of a sports car road race in the small town...

AUTOMOBILE INSPIRATION: THE RED CAR (1954)

Much conflict and excitement ensues.....

The story introduces the then-new foreign sports car philosophy and culture to the reader. By the end of the book the reader wants to buy a sports car and join the "cool" sports car community. For two decades American boys read this book and many were inspired to someday own a sports car, especially an MG TC or a later MG.

The Red Car book became exceptionally popular in the 1950s and 1960s, but I never read it when I was in school. Over the years I have met many MG enthusiasts who were greatly influenced by this one book. I recently bought (\$13.99) a new reprint copy from Moss Motors and read it.

Now I see the appeal of the book, the author never talks down to the reader. And there is a lot of interesting mechanical information, sports car driving techniques, racing strategy and character backstories and individual growth—especially for the adults! The author also comments on many of the sports cars of the period, including Austin-Healey, Jaguar XK120, Ferrari, Aston-Martin, Siata, and the MG TC, TD and TF cars.

Of course it's a predictable mid-1950s children's book, where the nice guys prevail and the mean people get what they deserve, nonetheless, it's a fun read. If you are interested in reading (or rereading) an influential old car short novel, I highly recommend The Red Car, but be prepared to be inspired to buy a vintage sports car! (again?)
