

Two fried eggs topped with Ranchero sauce and melted cheese and hashbrowns.



Visit the USS MIDWAY Tuesday, March 7 for a Docent-Led tour of a Navy Aircraft Carrier and static planes by knowledgeable Midway Docents, plus hear Jim Binford chime in on his navy experience on carriers. This tour will provide more insight into how our Navy Aircraft carriers operate as well as be able to explore some of the command and control spaces that have recently be opened up to the public in addition to the other ship and aircraft exhibits.



Details:

Logistics: We will depart from the Lower Library Parking Lot

on Thursday March 7 at 8:30 AM. The tour is expected to last about three hours and you can view other Midway exhibits, take your time, and get lunch aboard the ship at the Fan Tail Grill. Best to group-up in the parking lot and Car-Pool down and back.

<u>Touring Navy Ships</u>: There are elevators that provide access from the Flight deck to the 2nd deck so those having ladder climbing difficulties can be accommodated. All tour attendees should wear comfortable walking shoes.

Headlight: A Tale of Peggy Sue

Doris and Steve Shapiro's 1957 Ford Thunderbird

Peggy Sue, Peggy Sue Oh, how my heart yearns for you Oh, Peggy, my Peggy Sue Oh, well, I love you, gal Yes, I love you, Peggy Sue

It's 1957 and Ford was on a rip. They had their new Lincoln Continental division launch in '56 and updated for '57. The new Skyliner, with its retractable hardtop, set an industry standard. In 1955 Ford launched the Thunderbird to compete with the Corvette. Billed as a sports car with personal luxury like real windows and door handles it was a success. Limitations of the trunk size was addressed in '56 with the continental kit...but that proved to be problematic in the handling department with too much tail weight. Finally in 1957 the truly sleek and beautiful Thunderbird was born.

Several years ago Doris and I had a white '57 Thunderbird, with a three-speed

manual transmission plus over-

drive. A great car, but the clutch pedal gave my hip way too many problems and so that T-bird was off to a new owner. Over the next few years, we kept our eye out for just the right replacement. We both agreed that having a Thunderbird in the family is a truly awesome.

Well last summer it happened. We found just the right one, a beautiful torch red Thunderbird with a rare combination of white interior, automatic transmission (yes they are 3 speeds) power steering/brakes/windows, air conditioning, port hole hardtop and white soft top. Her name was Peggy Sue. Doris saw the pictures and to my amazement said that's the one...go buy it (words all car guys love to hear).




Peggy Sue had been restored to original condition a few years back by Amos Minter, who is considered the best in the industry. Seven years ago, we moved to Fallbrook from Oceanside and purchased a house with a 5 car garage. Problem, I already had 5 cars in the garage. But, with a 4-post lift I managed to fit 6 (lots of jockeying around for me). The Thunderbird is an awesome throwback to simpler times. She drives amazingly well, allowing Doris and I to enjoy the back country roads of Fallbrook and beyond.



History Bits

WD-40

Steve Shapiro sent me this email on the wonders and uses of WD-40. Could I maybe use this piece in the Talepipe? That got me thinking about more information on the history of the product. Where was it first invented? Guess what, right here in San Diego! The year was 1953 and three chemist struggled to make a line of rust-



prevention solvents and degreasers for use in the aerospace industry. It took them 40 attempts to get the water displacing formula worked out. But they must have been really good, because the original secret formula for WD-40® Multi-Use Product -which stands for Water Displacement perfected on the 40th try—is still in use today.



"Convair, an aerospace contractor, first used WD-40 Multi-Use Product to protect the outer skin of the Atlas Missile from rust and corrosion. The product actually worked so well that several employees snuck some cans out of the plant to use at home."

"A few years following WD-40 Multi-Use Product's first industrial use, Rocket Chemical Company founder Norm Larsen experimented with putting WD-40 Multi-Use Product into aerosol cans, reasoning that consumers might find a use for the product at home as some of the employees had. The product continued to sell well over the course of nine years being sent to Vietnam to condition soldiers riffles and help hurricane victims recondition cars and farm equipment. In 1969 the company was renamed after the product's name, WD-40 Inc. In 1973 the company went on the stock market and it's shares increased by 61% in just one day.

Did you know the favorite use in the state of New York, it protects the Statue of Liberty from the elements. Also that WD-40 attracts fish. Spray a little on live bait or lures and you will be catching the big one in no time. Also, it's a lot cheaper than the chemical attractants that are made for just that purpose. Use it for fire ant bites. It takes the sting away immediately and stops the itch. It is great for removing crayon from walls. Spray it on the marks and wipe with a clean rag. If you spray it inside a wet distributor cap, it will displace the moisture, allowing the engine to start.

History Bits

WD-40 continued

Ken East (one of the original founders) says there is nothing in WD-40 that would hurt you.










Next in December we met at Sheila's House for a Holiday luncheon, Wednesday December 13th at noon. Sheila had beautiful tables set and the food was delicious.

Dear Member, My name is Jackson Liebes, I am a 16-year-old BSA Scout working towards my Eagle Scout Rank, the highest rank in scouting. The largest and most expensive part of my Eagle Scout Rank is the Eagle Scout Service Project I must complete.
