





#### **History Bits**

#### DRIVE-IN MOVIE THEATER MEMORIES

Most Americans, at least over the age of 60, have fond memories of drive-in movie theaters. It all began with the long line of cars approaching the gate. The driver had to stop, pay admission for the number of adults and children in the car—and of course, never including any teen hiding in the trunk! Some cars were filled with families, eager to have an inexpensive family outing, while other cars were packed full of teens, looking for some evening excitement. And a few cars had only a single couple. The older couples were probably planning on watching the film, whereas the teen couples likely had other "plans" in mind.



Remember driving into the parking area? Some drive-ins carefully controlled the parking, while others allowed some freedom, so people scrambled to find their desired parking spot. When you finally pulled into your stall there was a slight incline, so you looked more directly at the giant outdoor movie screen. The driver would often pull forward and then back to get that "perfect" view of the screen.

Do you remember what happened if you arrived late? You were expected to turn off your headlights as you approached. Inevitably there was always some "dummy" who arrived late and drove in with their headlights



turned "on", which lit up the whole movie screen as they parked. This rude behavior usually resulting in people honking their horns and yelling, "LIGHTS!!"

Once you were parked, it was the drivers responsibility to attach the silver speaker box to the driver's window. If the driver was too short or parked too far from the speaker pole, he/she had to hang out the window or open the door to reach the speaker. No one can forget those terrible drivein speakers. Honestly, even by the standards of the day,

when most cars only an AM radio with a single dash speaker, drive-in movie speakers always sounded like a small "pocket" AM radio, in a steel garbage can, at best. Needless to say, watching a Hollywood musical at a drive-in theater was a very poor choice.

Remember what you ate (and drank) at the drive-In? Some families brought their own snacks from home, usually to save money, but other families would head over to the Snack Bar. If you were a small kid, the Snack Bar was an amazing place, packed with people and filled with many of your favorite foods.

#### DRIVE-IN MOVIE THEATER MEMORIES

Some teens brought their own liquid "refreshments" but most teen still bought popcorn and stuff at the snack bar too. If you were a teen, without a date, it wasn't all hopeless, the Snack Bar was a good place to meet other teens. You might have arrived with your friends, but you could watch the movies with someone new.

After returning to your car, and munching on some snacks, the drivein lights would eventually dim and the projector would light up the screen. Do

you remember feeling the excitement? Sometimes the audience in their cars would actually clap and briefly cheer as the movies started.

Drive-in movies were usually a double-feature. Actually there were two films, plus cartoons, previews, and don't forget, those musical reminders to visit the snack bar. When the feature film finally stared, most everyone in the car would concentrate on the film, at least for a while. Arguably the best films to watch at a drive-In were action movies, like Westerns, or anything with a good car chase or two. Science fiction films were often fun and the horror films really helped young couples get closer. The guy would bravely put his arm around his date and she would lean into him for "protection". Fun.

The feature film was usually a new release film, but the second film could be anything. If the second film was boring, you could always go back to the Snack Bar for more food or to meet new people. If you were a parent, and the kids were being annoying, you could send them to the playground, so you could watch the film in peace.

And if you were on a "good" date, you might chose to "steam up the windows" instead of watching the film. More



fun!

When the weather was good and you could watch the movies from outside of your car. Some people brought folding chairs. Did you ever sit on the car hood and lean back on the windshield to watch the movie? And then there were the parents who would put their kids on the car roof, especially if they had a station wagon with a roof rack.

If you decided to stay for both films, and all, it was 4+ hours of evening entrainment, but sooner or later it was time to go. By

far, the most important thing to remember was to remove the speaker from your door window. Inevitably, someone would forget and the speaker would either fall to the ground (I did that once!) or if you were really unlucky,

the speaker would break the driver's window. Do you remember hearing the sound of shattering window glass after the movies? Did you laugh at their misfortune?

Sadly, most of the old drive-In theaters are gone now. It certainly was a really bad place to watch a good film, but the drive-in movie experience was often very memorable. Today most older Americans have fond memories of going to drive-Ins with our families, friends and dates. Those were good times, good times indeed.
