# BMW 1990 E30 M3



Growing up in a small farming community in the Midwest, I didn't have exposure to foreign sports cars until I joined the Navy and started flight training at Pensacola Florida. One couldn't leave the base without passing several European car dealerships, so naturedly I had to purchase my first sport car after I was commissioned an Ensign in 1965. It was an 1965 Austin Healey 3000, but soon sold as family grew and I was back to Chevrolets. But now I have the sports car bug, plus an inherited fast foot from my mother.

Fast forward to 1998. I am working in Washington DC with no car being a geographic bachelor and employing the underground METRO subway to commute to work. I was flying to San Diego every other week to visit Myrna who was working and living in South Bay Eastlake. I had already purchased a succession of Porsche 911's, but living in a DC apartment with no garage I did not want to bring my Porsche to DC. Besides I was racing the Porsche when home weekends in SOCAL. I had fallen off the slippery slope and picked up an expensive hobby racing Porsches at tracks around southern California. As my need for speed grew in DC but with no car, I purchased a 1987 E30 BMW 325is as my commuter car and weekend track car at Summit Point Raceway near WASH DC.

I really enjoyed the BMW 325is as a perfect lightweight great commuter handling car with a back seat which the 911 Porsche is lacking if you're an adult. While racing with the BMW club at Summit Point I became acquainted with the E30 BMW M3 owned by several BMW instructors, since the car would run circles around me.

The E30 BMW M3 manufactured 1985-1994 is a proper E30 coupe with dynamic bodywork and high revving four-cylinder (S14) engine and racing suspension noted for its handling, balance and driving experience. It was designed



as a homologation model for European Group A rally racing with over 1500 victories including the 24-hour Nürburgring race. The E30 M3 has earned the nickname "God's Chariot" and is now considered to be a classic BMW. The car is a legend in the racing sports car world. So I now have the bug for an E30 BMW M3.


As I am researching the M3 model and trying to find one for sale, I get a call from my son in law in Colorado that he has found my perfect M3. This is a special one which I will describe shortly. So off on a plane to Denver, to purchase the modified 1990 E30 M3, and a quick enjoyable drive back to DC.

So, I am now the proud owner for approximately 25 years of a special red 1990 E30 BMW M3 which I intend to keep until I have to give up my driver's license.

My M3 was modified by previous owner to have fitted a 1995 E36 M3 6-cylinder (\$50) engine vs. the stock 4 cylinder. I now have 250 HP vs. the stock 187 HP \$14 engine with a lot of low-end torque. The transmission is also a later E36 tranny plus a BMW Z3 differential to match drive train.



The car also has a race driving steering wheel, roll bar and 5-point seat belts to keep me

strapped in. Modifications I have installed are bigger BREMBO brakes with brake ducting cooling but had to increase wheels to 17-inch vs. stock 15-inch to fit the brake calibers plus previously ran sticky soft race tires. I really enjoy seeing the club vintage cars but I need good stopping brakes. I also installed a rev limiter LED light to ensure I shift before reach rev limit.

# BMW 1990 E30 M3





My license plate is M3 SIX so other drivers know the M3 is modified and don't feel so bad when I pass them. My E30 M3 won't compete top end with my Porsche 2007 997.1 GT3 but the M3 is quite capable on twisty roads. The only issue is the tight fit in the engine bay that did not allow for a radiator fan, so below 40 MPH the engine sometimes heats up. I do have a small electric fan I can turn on that helps cool the radiator at slow speeds but that issue and 5 speed stick / clutch shifting is not enjoyable tooling around Fallbrook at slow speeds.

So, some brief info re Myrna and me. I am lucky to have a wife who has no interest in racing or fast cars (although she is a good driver) but accepts my race cars are an investment for retirement, even though I avoid the discussion of when am I going to sell them. I also belong to a bike riding group riding 40 -50 miles on Wednesdays but I am a slower rider nowadays. We have happily lived in Fallbrook since 2001 having both grown up in small farming towns in Illinois (we did meet in Chicago) so the friendly town of Fallbrook reminds us of our roots. We definitely enjoy the small-town atmosphere of Fallbrook and I the nearby backroad drives since I no longer do track events. While we have lived in many areas during my Navy career including two years in Yokosuka Japan, Fallbrook is homeland. We are certainly blessed to know so many special Fallbrook friends. We belong to four car clubs but the members of the FVCC are special and we appreciate their friendship. See you on the road (just drive faster – Ha!)

PS – I do like to give E ticket safe rides in my sport cars (I am still a national track Porsche and BMW instructor) so if you want an exhilarating fun ride sign up with me up while I still have my license.



### **History Bits: EUROPEAN CARS WITH AMERICAN POWER**

It might be hard to imagine today, but there was a time when some European cars were sold with big American V8 engines. For three decades, from the 1950s and into the 1970s, a group of small European car companies, or their American importers, chose to install big American V8 engines in their cars. Back then, most European car engines were small and produced low horsepower and torque, whereas the big American V8s had high horsepower and prodigious torque. In addition, the American V8s were considered more reliable than their European counterparts. Here are ten of the most famous American V8 powered European cars.

#### **AC COBRA**



Production Years: 1962-67

Notes: AC Ace with Shelby installed Ford V8; 11.5 sec. 0-100-0 mph record (427); successful race car; the most copied car ever!

and Carroll Shelby (AC Cobra, Shelby Mustangs) raced Allards in the 1950s.



Looking back, it was a simple formula: Install a big American V8 in a European car to produce a stylish high-performance automobile—gas mileage be damned! Most of these American V8 powered European cars sold in the hundreds, but the Interceptor, Pantera, and the Tiger, sold in the thousands. Over time the larger European manufacturers (BMW, Daimler, Mercedes, Rolls-Royce and others) produced their own V8 engines, so American V8 engines mostly fell out of favor. Today there are a few exotic European cars with modern American V8 power, but Golden Age of American V8 powered European cars was the 1950s to the 1970s.

Those three decades of American V8 powered European cars had an outsized impact on automotive history. When new, many of these cars were among the fastest cars on the road, and some were the fastest on the race track. Consequently, these unusual mixed-breed sports cars and luxury cars became legendary—and certainly worth knowing and remembering!




