



The Lovable Orphan Cars

American Automobile Companies that Failed After WW2

After the war the American public was starving for new cars, since production had stopped in early 1942. Almost anything would sell—that is, until supply caught up to demand in the 1950s. Ultimately the "economy of scale" advantage of The Big Three (GM, Ford and Chrysler) forced most of the smaller "Independents" out of the market. Today these cars are known as "orphans". All of these orphan cars have interesting histories, and with a few exceptions, are surprisingly inexpensive to buy. You will likely remember many of these orphan cars, some fondly and others not so much.

Here are some of the postwar orphans:

AMC (1954-88)

The result of the merger of Hudson (1909-54) and Nash (1916-54). Sold wide variety of cars: Rambler, Hornet, Gremlin, Pacer, Ambassador, Rebel, Matador, Marlin, Javelin, AMX, Eagle, Jeep, Wagoneer... Production: 1.6+ million.



Allstate (1952-3)

Rebadged version of the Henry J car made by Kaiser and sold through Sears department stores. Production: 2,363

Bricklin SV-1 (1974-76)

Canadian-built, with "gull-wing" doors, a fiberglass body, and a big American V8. Known as the "safety" sports car. Production: <3,000.





Checker (1960-82)

Famous taxi company sold durable, but dated cars to the general public. Production: est. <20,000 non-taxicab cars

Crosley (1939-1952)

Super-salesman, known for auto parts, radios, aircraft, refrigerators and being the Cincinnati Reds team owner, produced a simple subcompact/micro car. It was a tiny car, with a fuel efficient 4 cylinder motor. Crosley adopted disc brakes very early. Production: 84,000





Davis (1947-8)

Los Angles, CA built aerodynamic 3-wheel, economy car. Production: 13

Del Mar (1949)

San Diego built prototypes of an attractive, low cost, small convertible. Quickly disappeared and forgotten.

Production: < 5






DeLorean (1981-83)

Former GM executive created a sports car with gull-wing doors, a stainless steel skin body, and a rear engine. This Ireland-built sports car is remembered for being a Time Machine in Back to the Future. Overproduction, poor build quality and high price doomed it. Production: est. 9,000

Glaspar G2 (1950-53)







Early, mid-market car company. One of the first to introduced an all-new postwar design, the "step down" cars; had great racing and sales success with the Hornet. By the early 1950s Hudson couldn't afford new body designs and new engines, chose to merge with Nash. Production: 500,000+

International Harvester (1953-80)

Legendary farm equipment company produced durable early SUVs, wagons and trucks. The Scout and TravelAll were very popular. Production: 500,000+





Kaiser, Kaiser-Frazier (1945-55)

California-based industrialist decided to produce inexpensive stylish cars after the war, culminating in the sexy Kaiser Darrin fiberglass sports car. Production: 760,000

King Midget (1946-70)

Air-cooled, 1 cylinder, 2 speed automatic, convertible micro car. Production: est. 5,000



Muntz Jet (1950-54)

Super-salesman, Earl "Madman" Muntz decided to make a sporty, personal luxury car. Designed by Frank Kurtis, using Lincoln and Cadillac motors. Production: 198

Nash (1916-54)

Originating in 1902 as Jeffery, which produced the Rambler cars. Nash survived the Great Depression and WW2; entered the post-war period strong. In 1949 Nash introduced their first new design, the "Airflyte", establishing a unique modern style, and offering many special features, including car seats that converted into a "bed". Nash also offered the first seatbelt option. Merged with Hudson to form AMC.



The Lovable Orphan Cars

American Automobile Companies that Failed After WW2

Packard (1899-1956) One of America's earliest American car companies, established a reputation for high quality engineering and luxury custom bodies. Produced the first production V12 engines. Offered midmarket "junior" cars to survive the Great Depression. After early postwar success, Packard desperately needed new V8 engines—and better styling. Packard was unable to survive alone in the market and merged with Studebaker.

Playboy (1947-51) Packard car dealer decided there is a need for a small convertible. Mostly "assembled" from outsourced driveline components, but it was the first to offer a retractable hardtop as standard. In wake of the Tucker "scandal" headlines, it proved impossible to find investors to expand the company. Production: 98





Studebaker (1902-68)

Former carriage builder sold quality cars at affordable prices. After the war Studebaker offered new body designs, absorbed Packard, introduced clever features, like a sliding roof station wagon and the Avante luxury sports coupe, but was unable to survive the 1960s.

Tucker (1947-8) Successful inventor and salesman tried to radically reshape the American automobile. He quickly ran into technical, political and ultimately legal trouble. Much-hyped when new and famous today because of the Tucker film. Production: 51





Willy-Overland (1908-53) The Overland history went back to 1903. From 1912 to 1918, Willys-Overland was the second largest producer, after Ford. Willys survived the Great Depression, designed the WW2 "Jeep", and was the top builder of Jeeps during the war (362K). Flush with cash after the war, at first Willys chose to sell only civilian Jeeps. Later Jeepsters, Jeep light trucks and wagons. In 1952 Willys offered the compact Willys Aero compact car model. Kaiser bought Willys in 1953, later sold to AMC in 1970. Production: postwar US 400,000+, plus 116,000 made in Brazil.

Zimmer (1980-88)

Florida-built, retro-styled luxury cars. Based on the Ford Mustang or Pontiac Fiero, with fiberglass body panels. Some models loosely resembled prewar Mercedes Benz sports cars. Iconic of the 1980s "Neo-classic" cars. Production: 1,700.



This list does not include all of the postwar orphan cars, but these are some of the better remembered orphans. If you drive one of these cars to your local Cars & Coffee, you are almost assured to have the only one there. Most are inexpensive to buy, and the replacement parts supply is decent for the high volume models, but with the low production cars, it might prove impossible to find parts. If you buy one, your orphan car will likely get more attention than the usual show hot rods, muscle cars, pony cars, classics and modern exotics. Love the orphans!
